WASH - Activity Update

Emergency Response

During the reporting period, ADRA conducted the technical assessment for installing new connections between the high concrete water tank and the public water network to increase the water pressure and access to clean water in the targeted area of Mayadin city, Deir ez-Zour to help mitigate the cholera outbreak in the area. ADRA also completed the technical assessment to rehabilitate the sewerage system of Al Thawra health center, which is the only health center providing cholera response in Deir ez-Zour city and the western rural part of the governorate. However, after discussions with the donor, it was decided to table these interventions for possible inclusion at a later time.

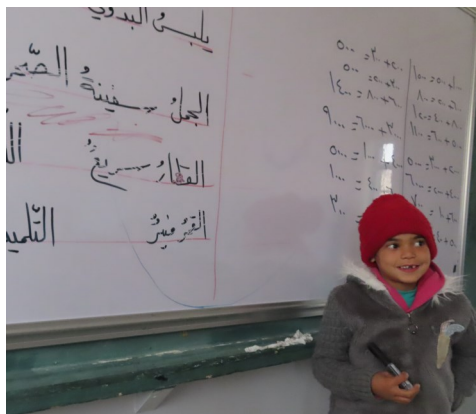

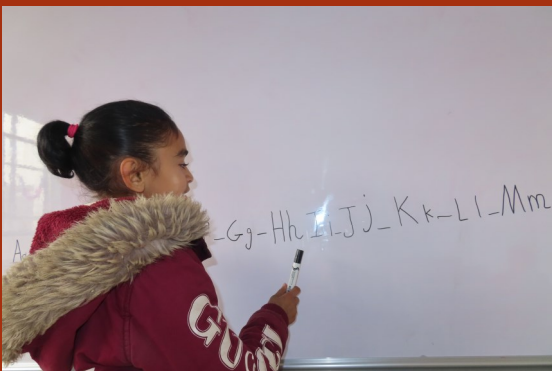
Out-of-school Children (OOSC) Program

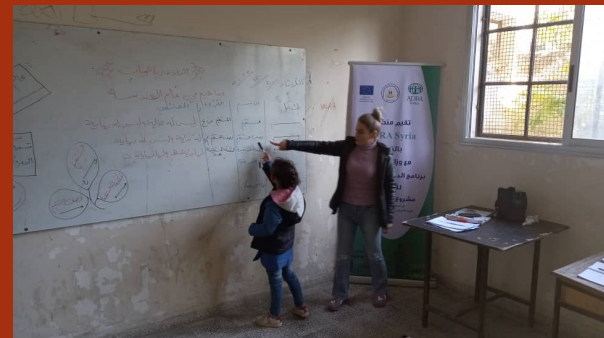

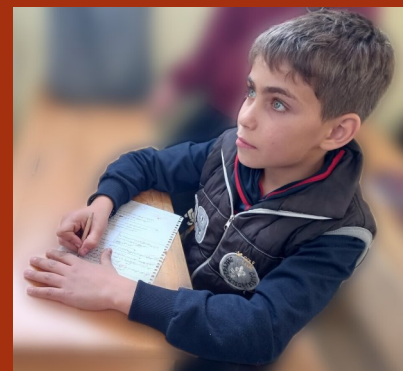
Remedial Classes

Non-Formal Education (NFE) Complementary Activities

Psychosocial Support (PSS) Activities: During the reporting period, the PSS counselors in Deir ez-Zour, Homs, Latakia, and Rural Damascus target schools continued attending classes with the remedial and OOSC students. When students needing additional support were identified by teachers or the counselors, individual PSS sessions were provided to these cases. Counselors continued sessions for the previously identified students.

The remedial classes in Arjoun, Homs, also included one hour of PPS sessions for teachers.

Recreational Activities: ADRA, in coordination with the recreational facilitators in the target schools in Deir ez-Zour, Homs, Latakia, and Rural Damascus provided daily recreational activities for children (one session for each class). These activities included arts and crafts, Physical Education (PE) activities to improve motor skills, focus games, such as rhythm imitation games, energy games, dancing, expressing feelings through drawing, etc.

School Kit Distribution: ADRA distributed school kits to 60 new students (46 girls and 14 boys) in the OOSC program and 280 new students (129 girls and 151 boys) in the Remedial Class program in Deir ez-Zour.

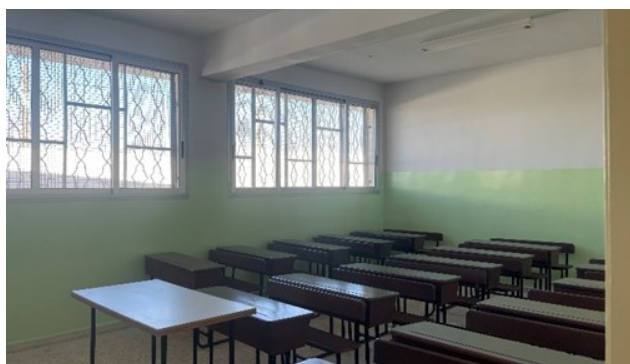

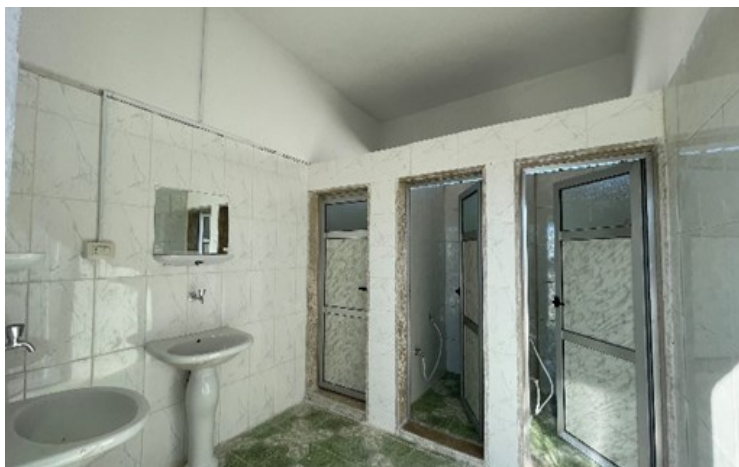

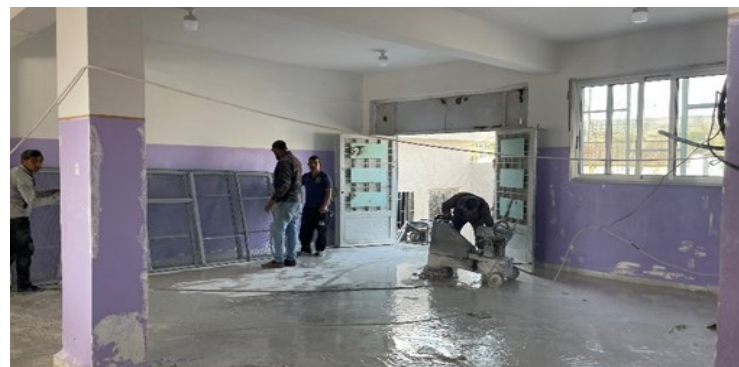

FOOD SECURITY— ENRICH Project

ADRA completed 406 home verification visits for potential target families in Qusair, Homs, filling out questionnaires to determine eligibility. More verification visits will be done in January 2023. After analysis, 500 households will be selected for food voucher distribution.

Nutrition Cash Distribution—SPARC Project:

ADRA conducted Introductory sessions for beneficiaries, identified through home visits, in Rastan, Homs for 67 participants on 14 December 2022. The one-hour sessions provided attendees with the background of ADRA, the aims of the SPARC project, funded by DANIDA, and the selection criteria for the beneficiary households. Attendees were informed that target households would receive a cash transfer to improve the nutrition status of the target families in February/ March 2023. The remaining 1,283 beneficiaries were notified via phone calls and text messages with ADRA planning to follow-up before the scheduled transfer.

LIVELIHOOD—COPE Project

Homs: On 26, 27, and 28 December 2022, ADRA provided training by a professor from Al Baath university in Homs, who specializes in Veterinary Medicine, for 64 beneficiaries who received livestock grants (40 males and 24 females). The topics included fundamentals of raising and caring for sheep, sheep feeding basics, care for pregnant sheep before and after birth, newborn care, udder care and proper milking, basics of controlling parasites in sheep, and finally, the most important diseases affecting sheep and methods of prevention. The sessions closed with questions and further discussion/clarification.

Latakia: ADRA finished distributing the livelihood grants in Latakia benefiting 60 females and 15 males for the following businesses: 27 sewing businesses, 16 groceries, 10 clothing shops, 7 hairdressers, 4 livestock, 3 makeup and cosmetic shops, 1 stationery shop, 1 painter, 1 bicycle repair shop, 1 stone mason, 1 metal polishing shop, 1 small restaurant, 1 concrete carpenter, 1 shop for handmade detergents. As Latakia is an urban area, most of the businesses were shops and services. However, for those receiving livestock, ADRA contracted a vet with an echo device to examine the all livestock before they were purchased to assess their age, to determine whether they were pregnant, and to ensure that no sick animals were provided to the beneficiaries. All payments for vendors were processed the same day to avoid delays and the negative effects of the exchange rate fluctuation in Syria.

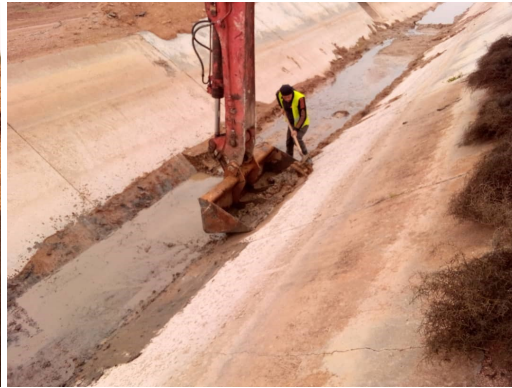


Irrigation Canal Rehabilitation—Aleppo

Rehabilitation of the Maskaneh irrigation canal in Aleppo continued, reaching 60% completion. ADRA also began cleaning the canal and provided necessary metal gates and is discussing replacing cracked slabs with the donor.

Irrigation Canal Rehabilitation—Deir ez-Zour

ADRA completed rehabilitation of the Majree al Taybeh irrigation canal in Deir ez-Zour, benefitting 700 households (3,500 individuals). Ms. Ana Kremenec from the Czech Republic Aid visited the canal along with a management team from ADRA Syria. A second phase of canal rehabilitation was discussed with the donor to complete an additional 500 meters south of the target area as a priority for the year 2023.

Winterization/Seasonal Cash Assistance—SCARF:

Early in the reporting period, ADRA made plans to conduct introductory sessions for the selected beneficiary households of persons with disabilities (PWD) (235 in Salamiyah, Hama and 77 in Rastan, Homs) and was able to contact 220 in Salamiyah, and 70 in Rastan. Unfortunately, telephones for the remaining target beneficiaries were out of coverage. The sessions were held on 20 and 21 December 2022 with 69 attending in Rastan and 172 attending in Salamiyah. During the sessions, participants learned about ADRA, the aims of the SCARF project, the selection criterion, and the mechanism for receiving the cash transfer of 523,300 SYP provided by Syrian Humanitarian Fund to purchase winterization items such as blankets, warm clothes, and heating. Distribution began in late December 2022, reaching 155 households (775 individuals). The remaining 1,195 households (5,975 individuals) will receive their distribution in January 2023.

Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) Cash Distribution—IMPACT Project:

During the same introductory sessions, ADRA explained the aims of the IMPACT project to the attending beneficiaries in Hama and Homs. The United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS) will provide two cash transfers to assist families of PWDs. Beneficiaries were also informed that the amount of the two transfers will depend on the number of PWDs in the household. The first distribution will be in late January 2023 and the second is scheduled for February 2023.

Rehabilitation of the Cadastral Affairs Building:

Rehabilitation of the Cadastral Affairs building in Deir ez-Zour was completed during December 2022. Initially, structural damage of the building was repaired, making it safe for the contractor and his team to work. Then, the ground floor was completed where services can resume and, due to savings discovered in the project, ADRA was also able to rehabilitate the basement of the building, used for filing and storage. It is expected that 350,000 individuals may benefit from the services provided to the community because of the completion of this activity, as well as the 83 employees working in the building.



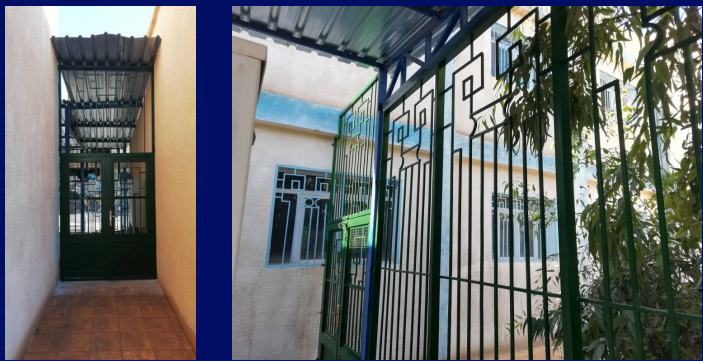

Health Center:

ADRA completed installation of protective fencing around the generator and two metal fuel tanks for the Al Hamedyah Health Center, in Deir ez-Zour City, benefitting 30,000 individuals.



Manhole Covers:

ADRA completed the provision of manhole covers in Homs (10 in Al Borhaneia, 2 in Sakarja, and 2 in Eastern Boayda), benefitting 3,700 individuals.



Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) Awareness Sessions:

ADRA completed PSEA training in Aleppo with 10 females and 18 males attending. The trainers explained the principles of PSEA and how beneficiaries can report any PSEA complaints using the complaint card. It was also emphasized that all services are free.
